



Australia's job market is showing signs of adjustment. The unemployment rate remained steady at 4.1% in February, reflecting stability despite shifts in employment figures. Seasonally adjusted full-time employment declined by 35,700, while part-time employment saw a decrease of 17,000.

Jobs and Skills Australia reported a 5.9% drop in online job ads in February (13,200 fewer ads), marking the largest monthly decline since late 2022. SEEK also noted a 1.8% dip in job ads following a strong January.

Despite these changes, the job market remains relatively healthy. The Federal Budget projects the unemployment rate to peak at 4.25%—a quarter of a percentage point lower than previously forecast in December, signaling resilience in the broader employment landscape.

A LOOK AT WHAT'S HAPPENING IN INDUSTRY SECTORS

TRADES



The longstanding issue of uniform trade licencing may be about to get attention, with the federal government funding states, territories, unions and employers to work on a national occupational licence for electrical trades. It would enable electricians to move to where they are needed and is being looked at as a template for possible extension to other licenced trades.

TRANSPORT AND LOGISTICS



Job ads in these sectors were down 3.4% in February. Total payroll jobs in transport industries have declined by 4,640 jobs (or 2%) between July 2021 and February 2024, according to Jobs and Skills Australia's Food Supply Chain Workforce study. The decrease was driven by the road freight sector. However, JSA reports good growth in other transport industries: Jobs in Air and Space Transport (up by 24%); Freight Forwarding Services (up by 10%); and Rail Freight Transport (up by 12%).

GOVERNMENT AND DEFENCE



Over the three months to February, the number of job ads in Government and Defence have dropped by 8%, according to SEEK. Federal government hiring has been muted in the lead up to the federal election, and state and territory government are under increasing pressure to restrain expenditure.

APPRENTICES AND TRAINEES



The number of apprentices and trainees 'in-training' stood at 333,765 at the end of September 2024, down 7.8% on a year earlier, according to NCVER. Trade apprenticeships decreased by 1.9%, to 232,610, while traineeships were down by a hefty 18.9%, to 101,120. Commencements were down 17.4% over the year, with the largest decreases among Construction, (down 18.6%) and Automotive and Engineering trades, (down 18%).
